GREETINGS from the GARDEN CLUB!

To members and all interested parties:

SINCE OUR LAST NEWSLETTER IN MARCH, we were able to have two in-person meetings: In May we had an outdoor meeting at the home of Fran Gardner, enjoying potluck dishes, collecting some dues, and listening to Lucy Kramer discuss the Community Gardens. In June we met outdoors at the Senior Center (on the day they reopened to the masked, vaccinated public). The few of us who came sat outside at the shaded patio and lamented the missed meetings and programs. Member Robert Dooley invited the group to visit his home and pick cherries, so we saw his amazing house and were inspired by his gardens in the hills of Willits. For June and summer, we again cancelled meetings as the Covid virus variant became a growing concern.

THE SENIOR GARDEN: Community Gardens require contracts to be signed each year, agreeing to the rules and regulations, and this year's contracts were executed in June and July. Work continues with community members working alongside the Willits Garden Club in the Willits Senior Center Community Garden, Large raised beds and cultivated rows in the back are fully utilized, and smaller elevated beds have been used as nurseries for young plants. The fruits trees and grapes are producing well, and produce is being shared to the Senior Center kitchen. Kudos again to Shannon for shepherding these efforts and planting unclaimed areas, often using plants donated by the Howard Hospital organic garden. Even the wild blackberries have produced well and two quarts of berries were donated to the kitchen for their desserts.

YELLOWJACKETS

INFORMATION about Bat Houses (useful!) and Yellowjacket Wasps (not as terrible as you think) is included with this Newsletter to members, or by request.



A **ladybug** is a good sign in a garden because it can mean fewer problems from pests, particularly the dreaded <u>aphids</u>. Aphids feed on plant tissues and can also transmit viruses to plants, but an adult **ladybug** may consume hundreds of aphids a day and thousands in its lifetime they literally gorge on aphids!
