
#### WILLITS SUMMER SOCIALS?

#### THE GARDEN IN WINTER

**December** is a rather quiet month in the garden. Plants are dormant and the weather doesn't generally attract us to spend time outdoors. But an occasional nice day may lure you out there looking for a way to spend some time in your garden. Go for it!


There are probably still some garden clean-up chores to do. Dead annuals can be pulled up and composted, and hardy perennials cut back. Time to tidy up. You can plant winter-blooming flowers like pansies and primroses to fill in the spaces. Now is a good time to take a look at your landscaping and see what would make it more attractive through the winter months Paths, steps, walls, gates and fences, which give structure, are more noticeable. Features like rocks, sculptures, statuary, trellises, benches and birdhouses add interest. Be creative!

January is a month of new beginnings. Time for fruit trees and grapevines, lilacs and roses, blueberries and strawberries. Time to browse through seed catalogs, choose new varieties, visit your local nursery. Make a plan for your vegetable garden, leaving room for perennial vegetables like asparagus, artichokes or rhubarb. January is also pruning time for most deciduous trees and shrubs. Roses and fruit trees need special attention.

As we watch the first spring bulbs pushing up out of the soil, we say to ourselves, "This year's garden will be the best ever!"
